# A great K80

If there was ever such a thing as a perfect all-rounder, the Krieghoff K80 Parcours may be it, suggests Vic

The Sporter shotgun is all things to all people. It was originally created by Browning in the 1970s as a Skeet gun with some choke and a Schnabel fore-end. Subsequently it has become anything the manufacturer decides it is, with every kind of rib, barrel length and stock configuration and weighing anything between 71/2lbs and up to 2lbs heavier.

The Krieghoff K80 as a Trap gun is a market leader in the UK, and as a Sporter it has enjoyed

some success. However, because of its considerable heft it has largely been in the hands of the particularly big and strong shooters.

Krieghoff has brought its considerable experience to bear and created a Sporter shotgun which, while retaining most of its antecedent's iconic features, provides it with characteristics that will undoubtedly broaden its market appeal.

### The action

The Krieghoff's unique sliding latch top fastening action needs no introduction, except to say its lock work, incorporating in-line

## The stock

gun-making expertise exists in a number of countries.

To achieve these things, the comb must ensure the aiming eve is sufficiently elevated above the rib to give the shooter a good view of the target and discourage him from making the kind of slow, poking swing

instrument and something that is in harmony with its user.

The gun stock - its configuration and dimensions is a key factor in creating this desirable quality and it's in this area that Krieghoff has concentrated much of its effort.

While no stock shape or dimensions are definitive, when it comes to game or Sporters, the task of the stock-maker is to make it as easy to manipulate as possible on targets at every height and angle, as well as to ensure the stock minimises recoil and helps the shooter place the shot charge accurately. Krieghoff has clearly understood all these requirements and has incorporated them into the Parcours' stock.

causes. It must also be sufficiently straight, which is to say the difference between the amount of drop at the front of the comb from the line of sight and the heel at the back is not too great.

This desirable arrangement ensures recoil is as straight backwards as possible and taken at the shooter's shoulder and not in the face. For those who in the past have had to put up with stocks which don't incorporate these principles, the Parcours' stock could be a revelation.

#### **Barrels**

These changes are all very well, but to get the best out of this kind of stock it needs to be fitted to a gun with handling qualities that complement it, and this often has a lot to do with the weight of the barrels.

The Krieghoff K80's barrels are usually free floating and adjustable for impact, as is the rib. The barrels are suitably heavy as they are usually

I have never handled a Krieghoff with anything like the balance and feel the Parcours possesses, but then the manufacturers had never before designed a gun of this type. There's no doubt it is a Sporter shotgun, with a weight of just 8lbs, but its dynamics are of a gun faster and lighter, combining low recoil and sufficient control to hit targets at long range. If there is such a thing as an all-round shotgun, the Parcours comes very close to it. A supremely well-balanced target gun, I would definitely like to be under some high pheasants with it. This was the general consensus of people I showed it to, most of whom only knew the Krieghoff as something much weightier: "It doesn't feel like a Krieghoff," they said. Well, the Parcours is still fundamentally a Krieghoff, with the same strong time-proven action which represents a singular combination of simplicity and sophistication. At the same time, it has been subtly re-specified to create one of the very best handling and potentially most effective Sporting shotguns I've seen.
